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

TotalEnergies strikes new oil discovery offshore Namibia, acquires drillship

TotalEnergies reports its latest deepwater drilling effort offshore Namibia has yielded positive results, suggesting another potential oil discovery.

This comes as assessments regarding its commercial viability remain underway.

According to Upstream, the drilling operation also targeted a northern extension of TotalEnergies' extensive Venus discovery.

This comes as, in 2022, TotalEnergies made a significant discovery of light oil with associated gas on the Venus prospect, located in block 2913B in the Orange Basin, offshore southern Namibia.

The Venus 1-X well encountered

approximately 84 metres of net oil pay in a good quality Lower Cretaceous reservoir.

The breakthrough follows a recent collaboration between TotalEnergies and Vantage Drilling International.

The companies have signed a binding agreement to establish a new joint venture (JV) that will acquire the Tungsten Explorer drillship from Vantage.

Under the terms of the agreement, TotalEnergies will pay \$199 million for a 75% interest in the JV that owns the rig, with Vantage retaining the remaining 25%.

Leveraging Vantage's extensive experience in deep offshore drilling and its longstanding partnership with TotalEnergies, the JV will engage Vantage to operate the Tungsten Explorer for 10 years.

Patrick Pouyanneģ, Chairman and CEO of TotalEnergies, expressed his satisfaction with the agreement, stating, "TotalEnergies is pleased to enter into this agreement with Vantage to take shared ownership of a drillship, the Tungsten Explorer, which we already used in exploration and development activities in Namibia, Cyprus, and Congo."

Pouyanneś added that the innovative partnership would provide TotalEnergies with both value and flexibility, allowing them to manage deep-offshore drilling costs effectively.

Ihab Toma, Chief Executive Officer of Vantage Drilling International, described the joint venture as a transformative event for the company.

"This joint venture underscores

TotalEnergies' confidence in Vantage, and our client's belief in the value of collaborating with a flexible and efficient drilling contractor," said Toma.

He emphasised that the proceeds from the sale of the Tungsten Explorer would significantly reduce the company's debt while establishing a long-term revenue stream.

The Tungsten Explorer, built in 2013, is a renowned offshore drillship designed for deep offshore drilling.

With a power capacity of 42MW, a thrust capacity of 33MW, and the ability to operate in diverse meteorological conditions, the rig has a proven track record of safe drilling operations worldwide.

Currently deployed in Namibia on the Mangetti-1X well, the Tungsten Explorer utilises Excellium additives, a premium fuel developed by TotalEnergies to optimise consumption and reduce emissions—marking a pioneering effort for the company.

TotalEnergies and Vantage Drilling International anticipates that the Tungsten Explorer, with its hookload capacity of 2.5 million pounds, offline capabilities, and state-of-the-art managed pressure drilling equipment, is well-equipped to meet TotalEnergies' envisaged future global drilling needs.

TotalEnergies is the operator with a 40% working interest, alongside QatarEnergy (30%), Impact Oil and Gas (20%) and NAMCOR (10%).

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
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Namibian SMEs battle innovation gaps, financial strains, global market barriers – UN

amibian small and medium enterprises (SMEs) face significant roadblocks in accessing lucrative international value chains, including innovation gaps, financial constraints, and global market barriers, according to a new report.

According to the United Nations Economic Commission for Africa (UNECA), SMEs are hindered by limited access to technology and financial constraints and struggle to navigate complex global markets.

The UNECA noted that stakeholders must unite to foster an environment conducive to SME development and resilience.

The report on 'Building linkages between micro, small and medium-sized enterprises and multinational companies from the global south' indicates that established SMEs are preferred suppliers for multinational enterprise affiliates.

"These enterprises benefit from backward linkages in terms of employment, wages, environmental sustainability, foreign buyers, and innovation. They receive more support from multinational enterprises and their relevant experience is a key factor in supplier selection," the report reads.

However, UNECA adds that established SMEs are less likely to form technological partnerships abroad and capitalise on innovation opportunities through direct market competition with foreign companies compared to younger enterprises.

The report highlighted that export-oriented SMEs are more likely to supply multinational enterprise affiliates and receive support from them.

"They benefit from backward linkages in terms of employment, wages, investments, sustainability, and innovation," said UNECA.

However, the report noted that foreign

companies tend to prefer local buyers focused on domestic markets for establishing forward linkages.

"Strongly domestic-oriented SMEs play a crucial role for multinational enterprises in establishing forward linkages," said the report.

The survey emphasised that innovative SMEs are more likely to establish linkages with foreign-owned companies, although they receive less support from foreign buyers and suppliers.

UNECA said the willingness of local SMEs to update production processes is a crucial factor in supplier selection.

"Innovative SMEs reap benefits in terms of employment, wages, investments, sustainability, buyers, and innovation. They are also more responsive to foreign competition and likely to establish technological partnerships with multinational



enterprise subsidiaries."

The report also revealed that larger local companies are preferred suppliers for foreign multinational enterprise affiliates and receive more support benefiting from backward linkages in various aspects and are more likely to establish forward linkages with foreign companies.

"Small size is a key obstacle for SMEs in accessing international value chains. Smaller companies, however, are more responsive to foreign competition and demonstrate greater flexibility in adapting to market changes," the study unveiled.

Similarly, access to external funding provides a competitive advantage for SMEs in receiving support from foreign buyers and reacting to market competition.

External funding facilitates investment and innovation. Informality poses a challenge for accessing external funds.

However, mobilising personal funding combined with external resources doesn't provide an advantage in supplier selection by multinational enterprise subsidiaries.

Another point highlighted was that the level of education of the local labour force does not significantly correlate with the establishment of linkages or partnerships with foreign companies.

"Lack of vocational training is highlighted as a weakness by Namibian stakeholders. Multinational enterprise affiliates provide support to local suppliers, including training opportunities," the report noted.



Namibia's ESG commitment boosts mineral sector investor confidence

amibia's commitment to environmental, social, and governance (ESG) principles is boosting investor confidence in the country's minerals sector, an official has said.

Speaking at the Mining Indaba in Cape Town, Consulate General of Namibia in Cape Town, Selma Nghinamundova, emphasised the importance of engagement in opportunities and potential that exists to achieve sustainable mining and maximise the value of resources.

She highlighted that Namibia has been ranked among the top world-class producers of rough diamonds, uranium, gold, zinc, acid grade fluorspar, copper, lead, limestone, cement, salt, and dimension stones, over the years.

The commodities have been exported in their raw form or with minimal processing before being exported to various destinations, rendering Namibia to not reap the maximum benefit from its resources.

"Henceforth, it is time for Namibia to recognise and embrace maximum benefits from its mineral resources," she said.

"Namibia also remains one of the most prospective jurisdictions for lithium, graphite, cobalt, rare earth metals and other minerals that are considered critical inputs in

the green technologies by many countries around the world. of critical minerals supply It is therefore our expectation that the number of interested parties seeking partnerships for critical raw materials (critical minerals) will increase due to the global demand for energy transition," Nghinamundova added.

She further noted that, in the past few years, the security



chains has become a global strategic issue, of which Namibia sees the interest in its critical minerals as an opportunity to derive maximum benefits.

Government has already taken a stance by banning the export of rare earth minerals in their raw formats, thus encouraging investors to set up processing industries locally.

"Just as any other country endowed with mineral resources, our goal is to add value to our minerals for viable projects. this regard, Namibia has developed its Minerals Beneficiation Strategy to maximise benefits from its mineral resources," she said.

SPS & Partners provide 10 MW Solar Solution to B2Gold's Otjikoto Mine in Namibia

Sustainable Power Solutions (SPS), together with its Namibian partners, Fortitude and the Oelofse family, are pioneering the latest development in Namibia's energy and mining sector.

N\$200 Million Renewable Energy Flagship Project

SPS is leading the development and funding of a N\$200 million investment in a 10MW solar plant, which will generate approximately 26 360 MWh of clean renewable energy per year. This will be the first wheeling project implemented under NamPower's Modified Single Buyer (MSB) framework, meaning that the solar plant will not be connected behind the customer's meter, but at a different location on Nampower's grid, with the clean energy generated by the solar plant being allocated or 'wheeled' to the customer.

Nampower's MSB framework empowers Independent Power Producers (IPPs) to produce and sell electricity directly to regional electricity distributors, large industrial and mining companies, as well as municipalities. This is an improvement to the previous single-buyer model, where electricity output was restricted to being sold only to NamPower.

The solar plant is being constructed on Maxwell Farm situated in North Central Namibia, and is set to be operational by the end of 2024.

The energy will be injected into NamPower's brandnew Eldorado substation from where it will be allocated under the MSB framework to B2Gold's Otjikoto Mine, located approximately 300 km north of Windhoek.

B2Gold is Namibia's leading gold producer, with an estimated gold output of 200,000 ounces in 2023 and a workforce of 976 employees.

Francois van Themaat, CEO of SPS, states, "We are thrilled to be developing this novel project for B2Gold with our Namibian partners - Fortitude and the Oelofse family. I want to thank NamPower and the ECB for their investor-friendly approach and for their assistance in making this project a reality."

Championing Sustainable Energy

SPS is a leading Sub-Saharan African funder, developer, and asset manager of solar PV & and battery storage plants in the commercial & industrial market. This initiative aims to ensure the effective provision of electricity, foster a competitive environment in the electricity industry, and encourage private sector investments in the industry.



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MTC awards N\$1.5 million bursary to 14 students

obile Telecommunications Ltd (MTC) has committed N\$1.5 million towards study funding for 14 students at various institutions of higher learning in Namibia, with the purpose of lessening the financial burden on them.

Six of the 14 students are external, while eight are internal MTC employees who are furthering their studies.

The bursary support is in addition to an initiative being undertaken by MTC and partners in driving the Namibia National Internship Programme, which offers Work Integrated Learning opportunities to

students.

To date, MTC has spent N\$7.4 million on the internship programme.

Another effort is the MTC Rural Schools Project, through which assistance is conveyed by building classrooms for schools, mainly in rural areas.

Regarding the rural schools project, the telco has funded a total of 37 classrooms and seven storerooms at a cost of N\$8.6 million to date.

"These are all deliberate interventions aimed at addressing fundamental challenges experienced at different stages of the

He further emphasized the need for corporates to continue complementing government efforts in the education sector.

"Any national cause must not be left to the state alone. We have NASFAF assisting students; however, that effort alone is not sufficient in addressing the issue of student funding. MTC, through our bursary scheme, is therefore proud to be assisting students from less privileged backgrounds to pursue and complete their studies and ultimately achieve their dreams."

"Education is key, and for us to be citizens that meaningfully contribute to the country's development, we must continue to invest in learning and acquiring knowledge, skills, and competency that will propel Namibia to greater heights," he stressed.

Katangolo further noted that it is sad to witness many brilliant students sit at home or, unfortunately, some dropping out of universities because they cannot afford the cost of pursuing their studies.

"As a country, we must not permit this to persist. We must address it collaboratively and ensure that every deserving Namibian has a fair shot at education."

The six external recipients are Anna Mary Ashipala, a 3rd-year bachelor's degree student in law at UNAM, Erkki Shilumbu and Willryna Basson, both in their third year of studying for a bachelor's degree in finance at NUST.

Also, a NUST student is Valerio Brito Manuel, a 3rd-year bachelor's degree student in computer science, in addition to Kadischa Wasserfall, a 3rd-year IUM student pursuing a Degree in Business Information Systems, and Verner Haimbili in his final year at UNAM undertaking a BSc in Computer Science.

At the handover, Katongolo reiterated MTC's commitment to its ethos and norm of providing bursary recipients with experiential learning opportunities, work guidance, and employment opportunities.

He said that upon completion of their studies, the telco absorbs these students into a graduate trainee programme, with the possibility of integrating them fully into the MTC workforce.

"This, however, depends on their performance," he said











Capricorn Foundation invests N\$1.5 million towards poverty alleviation, malnutrition projects

he Capricorn Foundation invested nearly N\$1.5 million in the past three months to address vulnerability in Namibia, making a significant impact in the fight against poverty and malnutrition.

The Foundation, funded by Capricorn Group's subsidiaries Bank Windhoek, Capricorn Asset Management and Entrepo, said its support to vulnerability initiatives addresses the basic needs of vulnerable groups, focusing on children and gender-based violence victim counselling.

"As a connector of positive change, the Capricorn Foundation is proud of its track record since it was launched in 2020 to bring about positive change through a portfolio of more than 40 projects and programmes across Namibia that continue to benefit from the Foundation's support," Capricorn Foundation Executive Officer Marlize Horn said.

Horn said 18% of Namibia's population lives below the poverty line, and almost a quarter of children in Namibia have stunted growth due to malnutrition hence the need for support.

In addition, she said the Capricorn Foundation partnered with the Nutrition and Food Security Alliance of Namibia (NAFSAN) on two initiatives to advance



food security and nutrition and address malnutrition through an allocation of N\$511,000.

"The first initiative is on Nutrition for Health – Embracing our Namibian Food Systems, which includes a comprehensive training manual and materials to cover 60 community-based trainings," she said.

"The second one is Malnutrition Support in Omaheke Region, aiming to save 300 severely malnourished children in the region through treatment and follow-up support, utilising a combination of Ready-To-Use-Therapeutic-Food (RUTF) and nutrient-rich High Protein Meals."

In addition, she said Imago Dei is an implementing partner of the Capricorn Foundation and manages over 15 projects targeting vulnerable communities.

The Foundation committed N\$400,000 to Imago Dei to acquire a 4x2 Isuzu D-Max, to reach beneficiaries in communities and informal settlements in the outskirts of Windhoek and other regions, addressing basic needs, education and training; job creation and psychosocial intervention.

Other listed beneficiaries include the Centre for Strategic Community Innovation, a voluntary association within the Okakarara Constituency, which

Further assistance was extended to the Response Action-Based Organisation (RABO) to which the Foundation reaffirmed its commitment by donating N\$300,000 towards food supplies, fuel, and other project-related costs.
